What is enteral nutrition?

Enteral nutrition describes any method of feeding that uses the gastrointestinal (GI) tract to deliver part of or all your caloric needs. When a person has difficulty consuming food due to difficulty swallowing and if the GI tract is working correctly, enteral nutrition may be recommended by your doctor. It can be short or long-term and may be taken orally or given by a feeding tube.

Feeding Methods:

- Bolus (syringe) feeding
- Gravity feeding
- Pump-assisted continuous feeding

Enteral Nutrition Facts

- Feeding tubes are tubes that allow you to feed yourself through your stomach without having to swallow. The tube is inserted through your nose (NG tube or Duo Tube) or through your abdomen (PEG tube, G tube, GJ tube).
- Equipment and supplies may include:
 - Formula: Most formula comes ready to use. Some formula comes in a powder or liquid that vou mix with water.
 - Syringe
 - Feeding adapter tube (if you have a button for long-term enteral nutrition)
 - Feeding pump (if receiving continuous feeding)
 - Formula bag with tubing (if receiving continuous feeding)
 - IV Pole (if receiving gravity feeding)

What is Parenteral Nutrition (PN)?

PN, including Total Parenteral Nutrition (TPN), is ordered for patients that are not able to eat or if their gastrointestinal (GI) tract does not absorb or process food correctly. It is always best to use your gut (GI tract) to obtain nutrition, but when this is not possible, PN will deliver nutrition by a unique liquid mixture given through an IV into a vein. The PN mixture contains protein, sugars, fats, vitamins, minerals, and other nutrients your body needs.

TPN Facts

- TPN is usually given 10 -14 hours a day
- Most TPN patients administer the TPN infusion on a pump at night so the the infusion does not interrupt their day.

• TPN is a complex therapy, and will require you to be monitored closely with lab work and for side effects. Our pharmacy and nutrition teams will work closely with your doctor to monitor how you are responding to the TPN. If something is not working, we will work together to make any changes
